

1 **TX-34 DISASTER – COVID-19 – ADDITIONAL DISASTER DISLOCATED WORKER FUNDING FOR BOARDS**  
2 **DISCUSSION PAPER**  
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4 **Background**

5 On April 16, 2020 the Department of Labor (DOL) awarded \$12,000,000 in Disaster Dislocated Worker  
6 Grant (DDWG) funds to expedite disaster relief services in Texas, and on September 29, TWC received  
7 an additional \$27,685,179 for a total of \$39,685,179 to serve a minimum of 2,042 Texans. Of the 28  
8 Workforce Development Boards (Boards), 16 have been participating in this DDWG to serve individuals  
9 and communities impacted by this pandemic.

10 **Issue**

11 DDWGs are supplemental resources that provide flexibility in responding and recovering from  
12 disasters, and DOL expects these grants to be aligned with existing state/local priorities, resources, and  
13 programs. DDWGs provide disaster-relief and humanitarian assistance employment, as well as career  
14 and training services, and support services, as appropriate, to minimize the employment and economic  
15 impact of declared disasters and emergency situations, in disaster-declared areas.

- 16 • *Career and Training Services.* Grant participants who are unlikely to return to their prior  
17 employment may receive assessment and case management services and job placement  
18 assistance. Those who require upskilling to return to work in a local demand occupation and  
19 may also receive short-term training. Participants will receive career and training services to  
20 assist with reentry into the workforce and upskilling into demand jobs.
- 21 • *Support services.* One or more support services such as transportation assistance, uniforms or  
22 other appropriate work attire, personal protective equipment, training supplies or others  
23 enable participants to participate in all services provided during the grant.
- 24 • *Disaster-relief employment.* A required service in the DDWG is Disaster Relief employment. DOL  
25 guidance indicates that these jobs must be made available to provide disaster-relief and  
26 humanitarian assistance employment to minimize the employment and economic impact of  
27 declared disasters and emergency situations. Participants will be placed in disaster relief  
28 employment opportunities and while earning a wage and providing valuable services to  
29 thousands of Texans.

30 To date, Boards have over \$1.4 mi. in expenditures, have enrolled 483 participants with 289  
31 participants in temporary employment as contact tracers, food bank workers and drivers delivering  
32 needed medications. Participants served and original funding amounts have been adjusted for each  
33 Board to reflect the additional funding from DOL in the chart below.

5 continue to bring regular updates to the Commission on the progress of these awards.

9 \$39,685,179 to serve a minimum of 2,042 Texans through the Disaster Dislocated Worker Grants with  
10 16 Boards.

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
